

MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

Today's Readings have some spectacular scenes. Often we are so taken in by the details of such scenes that we fail to step back and comprehend their meaning. So take a moment to relax and listen carefully to the message of these readings.

The First Reading is from the Book of the Prophet Ezekiel (37:12-14). At the time of this story, the people of Israel are captives in Babylon, languishing as if they were "dry bones in the desert." Through this vision of the dry bones, God tells the Prophet to announce that He will in time restore the exiled people of Judah. This will not be a return to their former status and shame under the Monarchy, but to a new life governed not by kings and princes but by the Holy Spirit dwelling within them. So, when you feel "down" or depressed, call on the Holy Spirit. He is within all who are baptized and waiting for our call.

The Responsorial Psalm (130:1-8) is one of the seven penitential Psalms used in various liturgies. In it, the psalmist begs for God's mercy and forgiveness of his sins. At the same time, this is an instruction to all the People of God to wait patiently in hope for the Lord's redemption.

The Second Reading is from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans (8:8-11). Paul gives the Romans and all of us an updated teaching similar to that of the Prophet Ezekiel above. "Updated" because this writing comes from a time after Christ's Resurrection and the Holy Spirit has been poured out on all mankind to guide us back to the Father. If we do not have the Spirit dwelling within us, we will be like those "dry bones in the desert." So "ask and you shall receive!"

The Gospel Reading is from the Gospel of John (11:1-45). Here we have an extensive teaching by Jesus but it is buried in a long story, one that everyone has heard many times. We are all captivated by the spectacular story of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead and rightly so. However, this is not the essence of this Gospel message. The real message is Jesus' statement, "I am the resurrection and the life," etc. Through this story and His statement, Jesus is telling all mankind that He is in control of both physical and spiritual life and we only need to have His Holy Spirit dwelling within us, guiding us, to partake of His resurrection. "Do you believe this?" Can you respond with the same answer as Martha did?

Throughout the season of Lent we have several vivid stories in the Gospel of John depicting the Gift of Eternal Life through our belief in Jesus: Rebirth in the story of Nicodemus (John 3), Living Water in the story of the Samaritan Woman (John 4), Life Giving Word in the cure of the Centurion's son (John 5), and, most of all, the Bread of Life in (John 6). So, if you missed the point of any of these readings, now would be a good time to go back and get acquainted with the real message behind the story. **Something to think about during your prayer time this week!**

When I saw the Lord Jesus, I poured out my whole heart before Him, all my troubles, fears, and apprehensions. Jesus lovingly listened to me and then said, **Be at peace**, **My child**, **I am with you**.

Go in great peace. All is ready; I have ordered, in My own special way, a private room to be prepared for you. Reassured and overwhelmed with gratitude, I went to bed (Diary, 1674).

WHY DO WE VEIL THE STATUES? - FROM FR. SMITH

In the Roman Missal we find this information: "In the Dioceses of the United States, the practice of covering crosses and images throughout the church from [the fifth] Sunday [of Lent] may be observed. Crosses remain covered until the end of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, but images remain covered until the beginning of the Easter Vigil."

While it may appear counterintuitive to veil statues and images during the final weeks of Lent, the Catholic Church recommends this practice to heighten our senses and build within us a longing for Easter Sunday. But why go through such lengths to cover up images that are designed to raise our hearts and minds toward heaven?

First, we use veils to alert us of the special time that we are in. When we walk into church and notice everything is covered, we immediately know that something is different. These last two weeks of Lent are meant to be a time of immediate preparation for the Sacred Triduum and these veils are a forceful reminder to get ready.

Secondly, the veils focus our attention on the words being said at Mass. When we listen to the Passion narrative, our senses are allowed to focus on the striking words from the Gospel and truly enter into the scene.

Third, the Church uses veils to produce a heightened sense of anticipation for Easter Sunday. This is further actualized when you attend daily Mass and see the veils each day. You don't want them to be there because they are hiding some very beautiful images.

And therein lies the whole point: the veils are not meant to be there forever. The images need to be unveiled; it is unnatural for them to be covered.

The unveiling before the Easter Vigil is a great reminder of our own life on earth. We live in a "veiled" world, in exile from our true home. It is only through salvation that the veil is lifted and we are finally able to see the beauty of everything in our lives.

This tradition that should not only be carried out in our parish but can also be a fruitful activity for the "domestic church" to practice. Families are also encouraged to imitate this practice and veil prominent religious images in their homes. It is also a beautiful tradition to pass down to our children, who will be intrigued by it, and it will make this time of year truly special for them. We go through great lengths to decorate our homes for Easter, so why not prepare for the great feast by using veils?
