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MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

This week the Church honored all the saints; those that we know and, more so, those that we don't know. Remember, everyone in heaven is a "saint." The word saint means "holy one," or one set apart who has reached the degree of holiness to be with God. You may recall the phrase in other scripture readings where God says, "Be holy for (or because) I am holy." Now, most of us might say, "Wow, how can anyone be as holy as God?" The answer to that is: we can't on our own, but God is there to help us if we are willing to bend our ways and heart to His way. Because God is divinely perfect, He cannot abide or live with anyone who is not perfect. Therefore, everyone who is in heaven has been made perfect by the grace of God and, perhaps, a little time in Purgatory. The subject of Purgatory was on our minds the very next day when we honored those still in Purgatory on the Feast of All Souls. Because this is such an important topic, I wanted to focus our attention on the readings from All Saints. It will be a good review for those who attended Mass on the Solemnity of All Saints (a holy day of obligation for all Catholics), and for those that didn't, a worthwhile first-time reflection.

The First Reading is from the Book of Revelation (7:2-4, 9-14). This first part of this passage talks about the people in heaven being *"signed"* with a seal. **This seal is the commitment of the Sacrament of Baptism.** The Sacrament of Baptism is more than a little sprinkling of water followed by a big party. It is a serious commitment to follow Jesus Christ in His teachings and His Church. When we do this we are assured of being among the large group mentioned in the second part of the passage.

The Responsorial Psalm is (24:1-6). This Psalm is a song sung by people entering heaven. It is a reminder of what they left behind, and what they are now about to encounter in heaven – the *"mountain of the Lord"* is an ancient Jewish expression for being with God in heaven. **Verse 4 of this Psalm is the ultimate detail, or requirement, for entrance to heaven.** We would do well to review this Psalm and to see if we are measuring up to its requirements.

The Second Reading is from the First Letter of John (3:1-3). This is such an important part of Holy Scripture that I encourage you to read the entire chapter. It contains the essence of what it takes to get into heaven and the alternative, which is a serious matter, but again, we cannot do this on our own. God wants to help us if we ask. So, I encourage you to read this chapter again privately and then see how you measure up. It can be a real eye opener.





ADORATION CHAPEL

"St. Martin de Porres identified with Jesus who was ignored and mistreated in the Blessed Sacrament. As they consoled each other, St. Martin became more charitable, not hostile, better not bitter. He would spend as many as eight hours each day in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. This so pleased Jesus that He made St. Martin a miracle worker. He would take a basket of fresh bread from the monastery and go out into the streets to feed the poor. With a single basket of bread he would feed an entire barrio. St. Martin fed hundreds of starving people with a single basket of bread. You . . . save hundreds of people from hell with a single holy hour of prayer in the Presence of the Living Bread come down from Heaven." ~From Letters to a Brother Priest



Jesus told St. Gertrude that this prayer releases 1,000 souls from Purgatory:

"Eternal Father, I offer Thee Most Precious Blood of Thy Divine Son, Jesus, in union with all the Masses said throughout the world today for all the holy souls in Purgatory, for sinners everywhere, for the sinners in the universal Church, those in my own home and within my family. Amen."

This St. Gertrude prayer is often prayed in November. St. Gertrude's Feast Day is November 16th.

PRO-LIFE THOUGHT OF THE WEEK VOTE NO - ALLOWS ABORTION THROUGH NINE MONTHS This Tuesday, the rights & safety of women, children, & parents are on the ballot.

Issue 1 not only puts women at risk & threatens parental rights, but this extreme amendment also allows abortions through all nine months of pregnancy. The vague language of Issue 1 endangers preborn children & Catholics <u>cannot</u> be silent when the most vulnerable are in harm's way.



All the baked goods will be plated on ceramic Christmas plates or holiday novelty items!


